I'LL BE WATCHING YOU

A New Book Offers a Behind-the-Scenes Look at The Police

At their sold-out show at the MGM Grand Garden Arena in June, The Police electrified the crowd with the opening notes of their seminal song "Message in a Bottle." This much hyped reunion tour—their first time on the road together in 23 years—puts an emphasis on their greatest hits. There was no fancy stage, complicated set or Cirque du Soleil-style theatrics. Instead, Andy Summers, Sting and Stewart Copeland reveled in the sheer joy of entertaining their cross-generational fans. Call it vintage Police, if you will, with the band notorious for its bad-boy antics eschewing carousing on the Strip for yoga, macrobiotic fare and sobriety. The concert was about family, too: Not only were the original members of The Police back in action, but the opening act, Fiction Plane, also featured Sting's son, Joe Sumner, on bass. Although they aren't at the level of The Police, Fiction Plane nevertheless relished their moment of arena fame.

The Police, too, seemed to savor performing together again. While they made a surprise appearance at the Grammys last February with their rendition of "Roxanne," their international tour kicked off in late May in Vancouver, Canada. With this outing, the trio marked the 30-year anniversary
